

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## **NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC**

Leo Sowerby, sometimes referred to as the dean of American church music, studied at the American Conservatory in Chicago where he later taught composition. He also served as organist/choirmaster at the Episcopal Cathedral of St. James in Chicago and eventually became founder and director of the College of Church Musicians at Washington National Cathedral. His style was heavily influenced by the jazz idioms that were emerging as he came of age. Praeludium on "Veni, Veni, Emmanuel" ("O Come, O Come, Emmanuel") is the first of a set of six pieces based on either Gregorian chant or a Lutheran chorale, one each for the seasons of the liturgical year between Advent and Pentecost. The familiar melody is heard unadorned in the pedal. The meandering accompaniment above it suggests the restlessness of humanity as it awaits the coming of a Savior.

Paul Manz was a distinguished American church musician and composer. He served as Cantor of Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in St. Paul, Minnesota and later as Professor of Church Music at Christ Seminary of the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. He was known as the "Dean of Hymn Festivals" since throughout his career he improvised and composed myriad hymn settings used to inspire congregational singing, often in the context of a service dedicated entirely to the singing of hymns. "E'en so, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come" was written in 1955 during a period of grave illness for his infant son John.

Jeanne Demessieux was a virtuoso French organist and composer. She was a student of Marcel Dupré and was the first female organist to sign a recording contract with a major label and to be invited to perform at Westminster Abbey and Westminster Cathedral in London. "Rorate Caeli" is the first of a set of twelve short preludes on Gregorian Chant themes that dates from 1947. 73 years later, during the early days of the COVID pandemic,

British organist, conductor, and broadcaster Anna Lapwood was inspired by Demessieux's precedent to commission 12 women from around the world to contribute pieces based on plainchant to a companion volume entitled "Gregoriana." Among those is Australian-American composer Melissa Dunphy, whose setting of "Rorate Caeli" is a fitting contrast to Demessieux's.

André J. Thomas is Visiting Professor of Conducting at Yale University and Interim Conductor of the Yale Camerata. He previously served on the faculty of Florida State University, where he is Emeritus Professor of Music. Like most spirituals, "Keep Your Lamps Trimmed and Burning" contains worlds of meaning that go far deeper than the surface of the text, in this case, the drudgery of forced labor and the need for enslaved persons to be ever watchful for opportunities to escape.

Andrew Carter hails from Leicester in the English Midlands and studied music at Leeds University before settling in York. During his time there, he founded the Chapter House Choir, an award winning mixed-voice concert group which he conducted for seventeen years, and for whom he penned many of his early published arrangements. Today his choral and instrumental music is performed worldwide. Though not an organist, his lifelong love for the instrument has led him to compose many works for it such as the acclaimed Toccata on "Veni, Emmanuel." The well-known Advent hymn serves as the basis for a toccata in the French style. An opening flourish for a solo trumpet stop precedes the entrance of the melody in the pedal accompanied by carillon-like passages for the manuals.
