





NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Old South's Lenten series delving into the Psalms is the outgrowth of conversations which began around the publication of a new metrical Psalter by the distinguished hymn writer and author Carl P. Daw Jr., now-retired Lecturer of Hymnology and Curator of the Hymnological Collections for Boston University's School of Theology. Daw served as Executive Director of The Hymn Society in the United States and Canada from 1996 to 2009, during which time the organization was headquartered at BU. It's hard to overstate Daw's impact on congregational song in the modern era — his texts are widely printed within hymnals of every denomination, and composers frequently set his texts as choral anthems. As an example, last Sunday's Festival Worship service included *two* texts by Carl Daw: our opening hymn, "We Have Come at Christ's Own Bidding" (1988), and "Sing of God Made Manifest" (1990), set as an anthem for choir by composer Bruce Neswick. Moreover, it is hardly uncommon to hear multiple Daw texts within a season (or, as we've seen, a single morning), so comprehensive and artful are his contributions to the genre. *New Century Hymnal* alone, by one measure, contains 9 of his texts, all of which date to before 1995 when it was published. One wonders how many of the texts since written might make it into a *Newer Century Hymnal!*

Just as it's not really possible to overstate Daw's contributions to congregational song generally, the same could be said for his achievement in compiling his new Psalter [*Praise, Lament, and Prayer — A Psalter for Singing*]. This is a seminal achievement by one of the great hymn writers of our era, and insight after insight springs forth from Daw's re-weaving of these ancient songs for our 21st century ears (and tongues). This has in part to do with Daw's deft handling of the pairing of text to music: here, Daw has prioritized familiar tunes, often with connotations or overtones which suggest a kinship. Thus, Psalm 100, described in its Hebrew subscription as "a psalm of thanksgiving," is paired with the tune ST. GEORGE'S WINDSOR ("Come Ye Thankful People Come"), given its strong associations of gathering for a service of corporate thanksgiving.

We'll have an opportunity to sample Dr. Daw's Psalter over the next several weeks in worship, and even to hear from the man himself during Community Hours on March 19 and 26 (please plan to attend! — you won't want to miss Carl Daw at Old South Church!). Rather than speak for him anymore than I've already done, I include now Dr. Daw's own commentary on the Psalms we sing today in worship.

Psalm 91: *You that take shelter with the Most High*

About one-fifth of the biblical psalms (34 out of 150) lack a Hebrew superscription, and Psalm 91 is one of them. In this case there are no internal clues regarding the identity of the psalmist or the date of the psalm. *Stanza 1:* The opening of the psalm establishes that the person being addressed has found sanctuary in the Temple. The essential thrust of the psalm provides assurance that faith in God allows the literal protection of this sacred space to be extended into a sense of God's protective presence in daily life. *Stanza 2:* The two greatest unpredictable threats to life in the ancient world were war and disease, which are used here to epitomize the dangers from which God provides protection. *Stanza 3:* By this point in the psalm the language about God as "dwelling place" is not so much a physical reality as a spiritual one, and this enduring spiritual reality is given priority over considerations of temporal existence. (The word translated as "home" here is actually "tent" in Hebrew, which is not chronologically compatible with the existence of the Temple. More likely it represents an archaic idiom adopted as a religious convention.) *Stanza 4:* In contrast to the earlier portions, which describe God's activity, the conclusion of the psalm is cast in God's own voice. The well-known Genevan Psalm tune RENDEZ Á DIEU effectively supports the confidence and assurance of this psalm.

Psalm 32: *Happy are those who are forgiven*

Traditionally attributed to David, this is one of thirteen psalms identified as a *maskil*, a word whose precise meaning is unclear, though its related roots suggest combined elements of artistic skill and spiritual understanding. This is also the second of the seven penitential psalms of Christian tradition. *Stanzas 1–2:* These two stanzas need to be considered together in order to appreciate how they reflect the organization of the psalm. The first two lines of Stanza 1 and the last two lines of Stanza 2 make general statements. These general statements are illustrated and confirmed by the narrative of the psalmist's experience described in the last four lines of Stanza 1 and the first four lines of Stanza 2. *Stanza 3:* This stanza continues to address God, celebrating God's protection and wisdom. *Stanza 4:* The final stanza offers words of wisdom to the faithful and encourages them to sing gratefully for the gift of forgiveness. Although it is classified as a penitential psalm, Psalm 32 is primarily concerned with the joy of being reconciled with God after acknowledging one's sins. For this reason, it is the only paraphrase of a penitential psalm in this collection that is set to a tune in a major rather than a minor key, BROTHER JAMES' AIR.
