### SCENE I.

It is night. The crystal-clear winter sky is dotted with stars, the Eastern star flaming amongst them. Outside a cottage sits Amahl, wrapped in an oversized cloak, playing his shepherd's pipe; his mother, at work inside the cottage, calls him to bed ("Amahl! Amahl!"). After much persuasion, he enters the house, but his mother does not believe him when he tells her there is a star 'as large as a window' hanging over their roof ("O Mother, You Should Go Out and See" — "Stop Bothering Me!"). Anguished over their increasingly dire economic situation, Amahl's mother weeps, praying that Amahl not become a beggar. He comforts her, suggesting that, were the pair to go begging, he would be successful in his appeals ("Don't Cry Mother Dear").

### **SCENE II.**

Amahl and his Mother settle down to sleep; the only lights are a faint glow in the fireplace and the radiance of the sky through the window. From a distance the voices of the three kings are heard ("From Far Away We Come"). Gradually they appear: first Melchior, bearing a coffer of gold, then Balthazar, bearing the chalice of myrrh, and finally Kaspar, bearing the urn of incense. Hearing a knock at the door, the mother tells Amahl to go see who it is ("Amahl... Yes Mother!"). Doubting Amahl's story, she goes to the door herself, and is stunned to find three kings outside the entrance. After she welcomes them in, the kings tell of their arduous star-led journey to visit a wondrous Child ("Good Evening!" — "Come In!"). The mother offers what hospitality she can, while Amahl acquaints himself with the visitors ("Are You a Real King?"; "This is My Box"). The mother returns ("Amahl, I Told You Not to Be a Nuisance!") and asks Amahl to rouse the neighboring shepherds in hopes they will provide refreshment and entertainment for the regal guests.

INTERLUDE: Shepherds' Dance

### **SCENE III.**

After the neighbors have left and the kings are resting, the mother attempts to steal some of the gold meant for the Holy Child ("All That Gold"), but is thwarted by the kings' page ("Thief! Thief!"). When Amahl wakes to find the page restraining his mother, he attacks him ("Don't You Dare!"). Understanding the mother's desperation, Melchior allows her to keep the gold, suggesting the Holy Child will need neither earthly power nor wealth to build his kingdom ("Oh, Woman, You May Keep the Gold"). But the mother, who has 'waited all her life for such a king,' asks Melchior to take it back. Amahl wishes to send a gift of his own to the Child, but has nothing to give except his crutch ("Oh, No, Wait"). When he offers it to the kings, his leg is miraculously healed ("I Walk, Mother"). With permission from his mother, he leaves with the kings to see the Child and give his crutch in thanks for being healed.

Amahl and the Night Visitors was the first opera commissioned especially for television, and was given its premiere by the NBC Television Opera Theatre in New York City on December 24, 1951.

the Old South Forum will host a five-week forum series engaging with the powerful documentary film Holding Up the Sky. Each session will offer in-person viewing and discussion opportunities, including time with the film's director Bob Nesson. This 55-minute documentary tells the remarkable stories of Ed Jordan and Jimmy Costello, two formerly incarcerated men who, despite contrasting social and family backgrounds and the difficult circumstances of their crimes, found purpose, hope, and success through mentorship and persistence. The film highlights their intertwined journeys through and beyond the prison system, shedding light on issues of social justice and reforms needed in our criminal justice system. The five-week series is designed to educate, inspire, and catalyze meaningful conversation and action. The film will be screened in three sections, all followed by a two-part exploratory discussion.
