

NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

Felix Mendelssohn (1809–1847) was one of a number of early Romantic composers (Schubert and Chopin are two others) gifted with immense creative genius, yet fated with an all-too-brief lifespan. As prodigious as any musical child — Mozart included — Mendelssohn was nevertheless spared the life of itinerant *wunderkind* by his doting parents, who instead provided the young Felix (as well as his talented sister, Fanny) a sheltered and supportive upbringing. Mendelssohn moved from success to success throughout his musical career. He was just 13 when his music first appeared in print, though he had begun composing long before. As the scion of a wealthy, influential family in the Prussian capital of Berlin, the works of Mendelssohn's youth were routinely premiered in his own home, often in performances by his private orchestra. These enviable circumstances were no mere indulgence, however, providing instead an environment which allowed his incredible talent every potential avenue for growth during these developmental years.

Today at Festival Worship, we hear a total of four movements from Mendelssohn's *Elijah*, perhaps the seminal oratorio of the early 19th century, and worthy successor to the models of Handel and Haydn. The aria "Lord God of Abraham" is Elijah the prophet's gentle plea to God to make a sure sign before the blasphemous Baalworshippers who had usurped from Yahweh the wayward tribes of Israel. It is immediately followed by a hushed concluding chorus, "Cast Thy Burden," which in the oratorio is sung by a quartet of 'angels' in response to Elijah's entreaty. As such, it has the effect of a Greek chorus commenting quietly on the drama. This aria and attached chorus herald a turning point in the work: shortly after, God releases a torrent of rain on the heretofore "dry, thirsty land," ending the drought that had long afflicted the population. The trio "Lift

Thine Eyes" and subsequent chorus come from much later in the work, as Elijah awaits God on Mount Horeb, longing for death. Another host of 'angels' arrive to restore his flagging spirit, urging him — in the words of Psalm 121 — to "lift thine eyes to the mountains." From this trio emerges the lyrical "He, watching over Israel," a Mendelssohn chorus *par excellence*. It is constructed of two disparate themes: the first contains a gentle upward leap at "slumbers," while the second, cast in a minor mode, ascends step-wise toward an accented word, "grief". Mendelssohn allows these two themes independent expositions before combining them in the final portion of the chorus.

Psalm 133: How good, how pleasant to behold

Psalm 133, the penultimate pilgrimage psalm, carries a Hebrew superscription as "A song of ascents," and it also bears an ascription to David. Its initial energetic identification of something commendable and its development of ideas through related images are characteristics of Wisdom psalms. It is offered here in an unrhymed paraphrase as a suggestion of how such observations could arise within that spiritual tradition. Stanza 1: Although the Hebrew text concerns only the harmonious life of "brothers," this paraphrase enlarges the frame of human reference and makes this text appropriate for use at weddings, at the blessing of a home, and at ecumenical or interfaith services. Stanza 2: The parallel images of downward motion for soothing oil and for summer's dew imply that peace comes down from God, as the third stanza affirms. The paraphrase has eliminated a problem in the Hebrew text, which refers to dew from Mount Hermon continuing to the hills of Zion. As numerous commentators have noted, this is topographically impossible. So the usual options are either to emend the Hebrew word for Zion to one meaning "parched" or to omit the reference to Mount Hermon. I have chosen the latter approach in order to maintain the mention of Zion in this pilgrimage psalm. Stanza 3: The Hebrew text never mentions shalom, but that is the unspoken subject of this psalm, perhaps because of the destination of the pilgrimage. Psalm 133 offers a quintessential illustration of *shalom* as the condition of living abundantly in harmony and mutual good will. This psalm's observations drawn from daily life make a folksong setting especially appropriate. O WALY WALY is an English folk melody collected and named by Cecil Sharp in his Folk Songs from Somerset (Series 3, 1906).

Like other pilgrimage psalms, Psalm 125 carries a Hebrew superscription as "A song of ascents." Because it celebrates Mount Zion without mentioning structure on it, scholars generally believe it was written during or after exile, prior to the rebuilding of the Temple. *Stanza 1:* The hills encircling Jerusalem also figure in the opening of Psalm 121, and it can be instructive to read these two psalms together. *Stanza 2:* God's protection of the faithful works in two directions: first, to protect them from the power of the wicked; and second, to prevent them from engaging in wicked deeds themselves. *Stanza 3:* The conclusion of the psalm turns from general statements to a direct prayer to God, asking for the promised benefits only God can provide. Like many texts in this meter, this paraphrase avoids conventional rhyme schemes in order to allow the French Diocesan tune CHRISTE SANCTORUM to provide a sufficient sense of order.

J.S. Bach's "O Lamm Gottes, unschuldig" ("Lamb of God, Pure and Sinless") comes from "Das Orgelbüchlein" ("A Little Organ Book"), a set of 45 brief chorale preludes meant as instruction pieces for beginner organists and likely composed while he was in prison. In 1717, he wished to leave the service of his royal employer, the Duke of Weimar, in order to accept a similar position in the court of the Prince of Anhalt-Cöthen. The Duke was none too pleased about this, and when Bach pressed the issue, the Duke had Bach imprisoned for a month before agreeing to let him go.

The chorale is a Lutheran paraphrase of the "Agnus Dei" from the Roman Catholic Communion liturgy. The melody appears as a canon of the fifth between alto and bass while the soprano and tenor counterpoint features Bach's appogiatura-based "sighing" motif.
